

Beginning at a point on the south side of Garrison Creek Road where Garrison Creek intersects with the road (A), proceed 350' east along Garrison Creek road (B). Then proceed 600' south along the property line (C), turning west for 500' to the branch of Garrison Creek (D). Then proceed 600' north along the branch to the point of origin

The boundary includes the house and all outbuildings and sufficient acreage to provide a setting. Some of the arable land near the house is included, as wel as portions of the hills above the house used for pasture and a section of Garrison Creek and its branch.

45. Description and House Plan:

The first section of this frame, hall-parlor house has the proportions and floor plan of typical rectangular single-pen log houses in the area. The 4 bays of the main (north) front are asymmetrically arranged; the unusually tall space above the openings allows for generous headroom in the upper half-story. The shed-roofed kitchen, a full-width room added to the south front about 1900, was not ceiled until about 1918. The windows of the kitchen addition, one of them shortened later, have six-over-six lights, unlike the two-over-two pane sashes of the first section of the house. The chimney, on the east end of the house, was built of stone around the firebox and brick for the flue. The fall in the land from east to west allows for the entrance and window to the cellar at the west end of the house.

The interior openings are finished with plain trabeated woodwork. The single-run staircase begins in the southwest corner of the larger east room and rises, enclosed behind a door, against the south wall of the west room; the space below the stair was left open. The fireplace was equipped with a coal grate, but a mantel was never added to the plaster chimneybreast.

The earliest of the outbuildings is a small <u>log pen</u>, erected perhaps in the third quarter of the 19th century and in deteriorated condition. It was used as a kitchen until the shed-roofed addition was built. A frame <u>smokehouse</u> with vertical-board sheathing is roughly contemporary with the house. The <u>small frame toolshed</u> southwest of the house was moved from another farm in the 1950s. The date of the frame privy is unknown. The original <u>barn</u> of the farmstead burned in 1932 and was replaced with the present structure in the

Boone County, involving less than fifty acres, in the period 1880-1938, a period in which the average farm in the county was between 80 and 95 acres.

following year. The nearby corn crib, a frame structure on high stone piers, was built in the late 1930s. A <u>shed</u> of unknown use and a <u>chicken house</u> are also included on the site. All outbuildings are gabled, all have metal roofs, and all are sheathed with vertical boards. All outbuildings, except the tool shed, moved to the site, were erected in the period of agricultural significance of the property and contribute to the significance of the property by illustrating the types of outbuildings necessary to family farming with less than 50 acres in the period.

The house overlooks Garrison Creek to the north and is reached by a ford across the creek. The arable land of the farmstead extends east and west from the house. The informal, close-knit grouping of the outbuildings, the nearness and small extent of the fields cultivated and the difficult, rolling site of this farmstead give it strong associations with small-scale farming in the late 19th and early 20th centuries.
