Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Situated near the small town of Union, the Benjamin Piatt Fowler House is a two-story, single-pile rectangular building of dressed limestone construction. The facade consists of five bays with a center entrance which is enhanced by a one-story, one-bay modillioned portico supported by two Ionic Order columns. All bays have limestone jackarches, and windows are 6/6 pane with limestone sills. A gable roof with boxed cornice with returns, and interior gable-end chimneys complete the structure. The walls are twenty-two inches thick with an endless chain laid in the mortar at each story.

The interior of the dwelling remains intact. The entrance hall is flanked by single rooms, which are of equal size, with fireplaces with plain mantels centered in the north and south walls. Both rooms retain the original chairrailing and wall presses. Interior door and window trim is plain with no embellishments. A two-run open stairway in the entrance hall leads to the second floor.

Structurally the house has been altered by a one-story limestone wing on the east gable end which was built ca.1930. In addition, the one-story portico over the facade entrance was added at the same time.

Associated with the house is a one-story limestone smokehouse constructed at the same time as the dwelling and approximately twentyfeet from the east end of the house.

Situated on a rise overlooking the highway from the front and Fowler Creek from the rear, the Fowler House is in an excellent state of repair. Although one hundred sixty-five years of age, the house has suffered no structural problems or deterioration.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Benjamin Piatt Fowler House is significant for its historical associations with the development of Boone County. The house is architecturally significant as one of nine stone houses documented in the county, and is the only one not situated on the Ohio River. The Fowler House is an outstanding example of stone masonry and significant for its detail and craftsmanship.

Born in Virginia, Benjamin Piatt Fowler was an early settler in Boone County which was established in 1798, the thirtieth county created in Kentucky. In 1817 he constructed his limestone house on land belonging to his father, Jacob Fowler. The limestone was quarried from a nearby creek which flows behind the house, and the creek was named after his family.

In 1821 Fowler purchased a two hundred fifty-eight acre tract of land, which included the stone house from his father for five hundred dollars. This land was part of a twenty-four hundred acre tract his father had purchased from a fifteen thousand acre land grant surveyed for Willouby Tibbs.

Primarily depending on the land for his livelihood, Fowler later built the Boone House also situated near Union, and operated a hotel there.

After Benjamin Fowler's death, the stone house and farm was inherited by his eldest son, Edward Fowler, who was superintendent and keeper of the poor farm in Boone County from 1856 to 1859. From 1861 to 1865 he was a deputy sheriff under W. H. Baker, and in 1866 he was elected Boone County Tax Assessor and served in this capacity until his death.


