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Piatt's Landing, or Winnfield Cottage as it was once known, is located on a flat river bottom along the Ohio River about 100 yards from the shore, in an area now known as East Bend Bottoms. The house faces west across the river to Indiana at a point west of Cincinnati where the course of the river flows from north to south. A large old pine tree nearby has long been a river landmark marked on navigation charts.

The house is an exceptionally handsome example of an Ohio River type that utilizes broad and deep recessed porches to catch the river breezes and form virtually an extra room facing the view. The house is large, but has only a single major story under a low hipped roof accented by well-placed chimneys near the ends. The portico is integrated with the interior by means of full-length windows and doors, and is closed at the ends by rooms treated as if in antis, which have triple exposures. Four superbly proportioned and widely spaced columns articulate the shadowed porch. On the land side the kitchen ell defines a semi-enclosed service court.

It would appear that the portico and central block were added, perhaps (on stylistic grounds) in the 1830s or '40s to link the earlier portions and provide an overall effect of contrast between the ceremonial unified riverfront and the varied, more complex, strictly functional and residual ends and rear, perhaps relating both to the already existing structures and outbuildings of the farm. Older and later portions are unified by a simple flat cornice board with projecting eaves.

Much of the interior woodwork--the frames of the long eightpaned window-doors, the "eared" door frames, and some of the
simpler mantels--have a discreetly Grecian effect in keeping
with the bold but simple colonnade of stucco-covered brick of
the portico. The central block, unusual for the area, is
revealed at the ends as having a gambrel roof; this may have
been a result of maintaining the desired long low profile from
the river while incorporating earlier structures and allowing
for service space on an upper floor. Certainly ventilation
and insulation of the main floor must have been an urgent
concern of the builders, considering the low-lying river
location.

A legal notice in the <u>Cincinnati Gazette</u> in 1856 described the property as a whole, and conveys a sense of the functional unity of an antebellum farm establishment:

"Winnfield Cottage" For Sale.

THE FARM OF THE LATE BENJAMIN F. CRUTCHFIELD, on the Ohio River, in Boone County, Kentucky, (known as "Winnfield Cottage,") is offered for sale. The Farm contains 154 acres -- one hundred in cultivation, the remainder well timbered. The improvements are a large, Brick Cottage, with eleven rooms, good cellars, bath room and store room, kitchen, wash house, servants' room, ice house, carriage, and smoke house; a well of excellent water and large cistern. The yard is ornamented with fine Trees and choice Shrubbery. On the place are 400 Apple Trees and other select Fruits, a fine Barn with good Stables, Corn Cribs, a good Horse Mill, Corn and Cob Crusher with Threshing Machine attached. Also, Wood Shed and Cow House, and an abundant supply of never-failing stock-water. In short, it is one of the best improved Farms in the State.

Persons desiring to purchase are invited to examine the property. They can ascertain the terms by application to Wm. Ernst, Covington, Ky., D. A. Russell, Danville, Ky., or Mrs. S. M. Crutchfield, on the premises.

Unfortunately, little remains of the outbuildings and plantings, although the house is still set among magnificent shade trees.

In spite of standing empty for a number of years, the house itself is in fairly sound structural condition and apparently would be suitable for restoration.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Piatt's Landing is one of the major landmarks of Boone County, which is located within a bend of the Ohio River at its farthest northward course west of Cincinnati. The county itself, carved out of Campbell County in 1798, developed along the river. The Landing was a frequent stopping place for flatboats early in the 19th century.

The Piatt family, many of whose descendants still live in northern Kentucky, derive from John Piatt, a Huguenot whose family with the child John fled France after the Revocation of the Edict of Nantes by Louis XIV. He settled in New Jersey. His five sons served as officers in Washington's Continental Army.

After the Revolution Jacob Piatt, John's youngest son, traveled westward with his family to Kentucky. In 1795 they arrived in Boone County (then still part of Campbell) and settled on a tract of land granted to Jacob in recognition of his services rendered during the Revolution. One of Jacob's older brothers, Daniel Piatt, came to Boone County in 1797 and, according to Geaslen, "settled downstream from Rabbit Hash, at a point which later became known as 'Piatt's Landing'." Probably a log house was the first on the site. It is thought that portions of the present house at the Landing were built about 1800.

Although little documentary evidence on the history of Daniel Piatt's house (later known as Winnfield Cottage) is available, it appears that the northeast wing of the structure may date from as early as about 1800; this may also be true of one or more of the other wings at the southeast end of the house which enclose a small courtyard that retains its hand pump. These end wings have smaller windows than those that look out onto the great portico. Its one-story design is an effective adaptation to the low-lying site and climate along the river.

The house at Piatt's Landing was the birthplace in 1817 of Major General Edward Richard Spriggs Canby, known as General E.R.S. Canby. His father, Dr. Israel Canby of Prince George County, Maryland, known onlyasan "amiable young man" had come to Piatt's Landing in 1814. Two years later Israel married Elizabeth Piatt, a granddaughter of the Huguenot John (who is referred to as "John of France" in family chronicles) and daughter of Daniel and settled in the present house.

Elizabeth and Caroline Piatt discuss Daniel Piatt, the original settler of Piatt's Landing in their Memorial Biography of Benjamin H. Piatt and Elizabeth His Wife:

Daniel, the fourth son of John of France, was born in New Brunswick, N. J., in 1745. He married Catherine Sherrad in 1765 and served in the first regiment of the New Jersey Brigade in the Revolutionary War, achieving the rank of major. His eldest daughter, Elizabeth, married Dr. Israel Canby, and was the mother of General Edward Richard Spriggs Canby, who was prominent in the late Civil War.

General Canby had a distinguished military career. After starting his education in the nearby East Bottoms School and then attending Wabash College in nearby Indiana, Canby in 1835 was admitted to the U. S. Military Academy at West Point from which he was graduated four years later in 1839.

Canby began his military career by removing conquered Seminole Indian Tribes to an Indian territory set aside for them in the Northwest. During the Mexican War, he served under General Riley in the siege of Vera Cruz; and in 1862, he was assigned to Washington as a Brigadier General. He served as an advisor to Edwin M. Stanton, Secretary of War. When the Draft Riots broke out in New York in 1863, he was dispatched there to restore order.

During the Civil War, as a Major General in command of The Department of the Mississippi, he and his army aided by Admiral Farragut and his fleet participated in the victory at the Battle of Mobile. On May 26, 1865, at Citronella, Alabama, Canby accepted the final surrender of Confederate forces from Confederate Generals Richard Tyalor and Kirby Smith, seven weeks after

General Robert E. Lee surrendered his army of Northern Virginia to General U. S. Grant at Appomattox Courthouse, Virginia.

In 1873 Canby, as Commander of The Department of Columbia, ended his brillant military career while negotiating a peace treaty with the Modoc Indians of Northern California. During this meeting, under a flag of truce, his party was ambushed and he received wounds from which he soon died.

General Canby spent only the first couple of years of his life at the Landing; his father sold the property back to the Piatts about 1818. It stayed in their hands until 1844, when it was sold to Benjamin Crutchfield, a prominent local landowner. His estate in turn sold it to Henry and Anna Goff and Charles Yeiser in 1863; the property has been in very few hands since then, and now is threatened by a power company which plans to develop a plant in the area.

In conclusion, Piatt's Landing is a site worthy of preservation because it is an example of early 19th century Ohio River architecture as well as the birthplace of a distinguished military leader of the Civil War.




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
