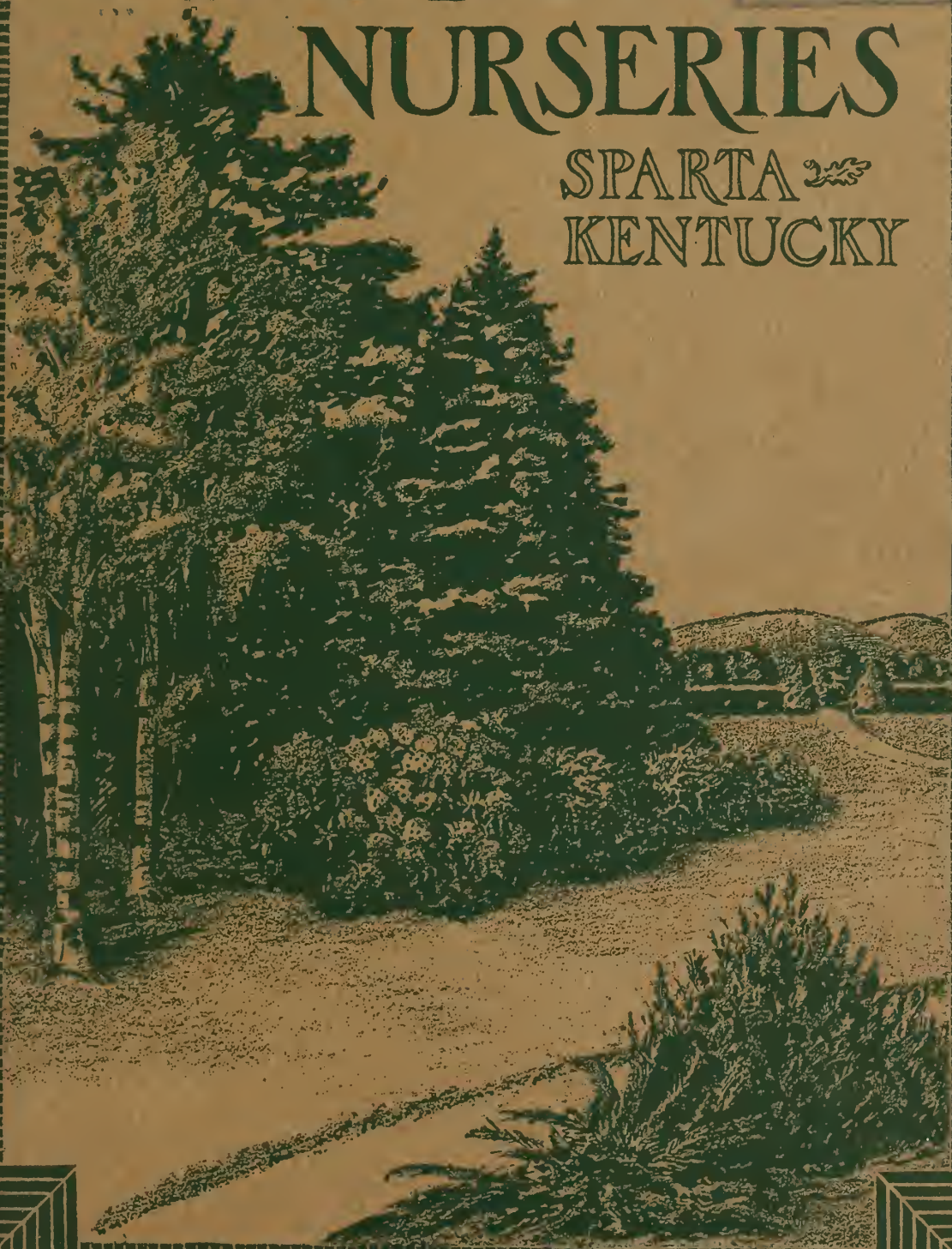

HOW TO DO BUSINESS WITH THE WILLADEAN NURSERIES

When to Order

Our spring shipping season begins March 1 and ends June 1. In the fall it begins in August and ends December 15. During this time we have a rush of business and all orders are filled on the principle of "first come, first served." Therefore, send your order early; the earlier, the better both for you and us.

How to Order

Look over this catalogue, write down the names, sizes, and prices of the trees and plants you want, tell us how many, and mail it direct to us. We will attend to it promptly. If your shipping point differs from your post office, be sure to tell us.

Prices

All prices in this catalogue are f. o. b. except in the few cases noted. They are as low as we can make them and we cannot prepay any charges unless enough money is sent to cover them.

Cash with Order

In all cases we request that you send cash direct with order. If shipment is to go prepaid, include enough to cover charges.

How to Send Money

Express Money Order, Bank Draft, or Registered Letter. If the goods are to be sent by Parcel Post, add enough to pay postage. If you send too much, the balance will be promptly returned to you.

Complaints

We sometimes make mistakes (everybody does for that matter) and we are always glad to rectify them, but all errors and omissions must be called to our attention immediately on receipt of the goods.

Responsibility

We always do the best we can to send our patrons the highest quality of trees and plants that we can produce. We do not guarantee them nor do we assume any responsibility after the goods leave our nurseries, for conditions always exist over which we have no control. In all agreements it is mutually understood between the buyer and us that we shall not be held responsible for any amount greater than the original price.

Who We Are and What We Do

EIGHTEEN YEARS of continued growth and better service have seen our nursery grow from a humble start of four acres to 155 acres. We could not have grown so rapidly had it not been for the way we treat our customers, both in our dealings and in the quality of the stock we send out. For eighteen continuous years we have given good service to our customers, and have sent them the kind of trees and plants that grow. Hence it has become necessary to issue this book—our first extensive catalogue. The proprietor and manager of the Willadean Nurseries is Mr. J. F. Donaldson. Mr. Donaldson has a lifetime experience in growing plants that make good. He founded the Willadean Nurseries, and under his guidance it has advanced with great strides. Mr. Donaldson gives his personal attention to the business and when you ask for planting information you get the benefit of his many years of growing satisfactory plants.

Willadean Plants Are Hardy

SPARTA is subject to sudden and severe climatic changes, and any plant that will live and thrive here will do well elsewhere. Philadelphia and Boston are considerably further north but plants that thrive in the vicinities of those cities die in Sparta's wintry weather.

Our soil here is a mixture of sandy loam and clay, and these materials make for hardy plants and strong fibrous root-systems. We ship plants to every state in the country, and even under the widely varying climatic conditions Willadean plants bear up well and give good results. Our shipping facilities are excellent. Our spring season begins about March 1 and continues until about June 1. Our fall season begins August 1, when we commence to ship evergreens, and from October 1 to December 15 we ship deciduous trees, shrubs, etc.

What Willadean Service Is

WHEN we say we serve you, we mean just that. If you are undecided what will look well on your grounds, write us. Tell us what kind of soil you have, the size of the ground, and give us a general idea of the layout. A rough

pencil sketch will give us an idea of what your grounds look like. Don't bother with an elaborate drawing; a rough sketch will do. Without cost to you we will advise you what to plant, taking into consideration location, climate, and soil. By doing this you get the advice and suggestions of experienced plantsmen who will cheerfully give you the information they have gathered from many years of work with plants. We will recommend only plants that we know will do well under your conditions.

Come to Sparta

WE are located so favorably both to Cincinnati and Louisville that it is an easy matter to reach our nurseries. We are on the Louisville & Nashville Railway, forty-five miles south of Cincinnati, and sixty-five miles north of Louisville. Covington, Dayton, and Newport are practically the same distance away as Cincinnati; so the Willadean Nurseries are easily accessible.

Take a day off and come to Sparta, where you can see how we do things. Then, if you wish, you may select your plants direct from the nursery rows. As you select your plants, they will be marked, and when you give us the word, they will be dug and shipped to you.

EVERGREEN TREES

For ornamental planting, evergreen trees are always dependable. They are hardy and readily take their proper place in any landscape scheme. For massed plantings they are more desirable than deciduous trees, while for specimen planting they also have a high value. In massed plantings a good method is to set out a few tall-growing varieties with lower growers in front.

Owing to the structure of the soil, our evergreens dig out with an excellent ball of earth around the roots. This protects them in transit and makes them come through the transplanting stage with flying colors.

Abies concolor. *White Fir.* A very hardy and graceful tree. Foliage heavy, bright green; cones usually purple. Grows rapidly and to considerable height. An excellent landscape tree.

CUPRESSUS • Cypress

Cupressus Lawsoniana. *Lawson's Cypress.* A hardy, rapid-growing tree, with light, feather-like foliage of bluish shining green. The branches are somewhat drooping. A good lawn tree and especially valuable in specimen plantings.

Juniperus canadensis. A splendid tree for mass plantings. A low grower, spreading nearly as far as its height. Foliage is a clear silvery green. An excellent effect is obtained when planted with darker-foliaged trees.

PICEA • Spruce

Picea alba. *White Spruce.* A very attractive tree of compact pyramidal form. Foliage is silvery gray. Grows to about 40 feet. Good for mass plantings.

P. excelsa. *Norway Spruce.* A handsome tree widely used for Christmas trees. Foliage is dark, shining green. The tree grows to considerable height. Has numerous uses, being valuable for hedges, or mass and specimen planting. Extremely hardy.

The foliage is a clear even shade of blue, which causes it to stand out well in comparison with other evergreens. For specimen planting or for massing in front of darker leaved evergreens, Koster's Blue Spruce has no competitor anywhere.

Whenever possible to plant in masses, we recommend it, for this method always shows them off to best advantage. This scheme is especially good for small shrubs, while the larger ones, such as the lilacs, make good specimens.

DECIDUOUS ORNAMENTAL AND SHADE TREES

On the lawn, street, and avenue the best trees to plant are the deciduous varieties—those that drop their leaves in the fall. They are not generally used in mass plantings, but as specimens their value is at once apparent. In clumps at the ends of a house or back of it, they give a higher tone to the house, forming a background and frame for the home picture.

Nearly all deciduous trees are hardy, and will grow well in a wide variation of latitude. They are especially desirable for the shade they furnish and for the beauty they add to the landscape. They are widely used in street and park planting, but nowhere do they show up to better advantage than on the home grounds.

In planting deciduous trees no special preparation of the soil is necessary, but the hole should be large enough to allow the tree to be set without the roots touching the sides of the excavation. Our trees are dug with good roots and should be planted as quickly as possible after arrival.

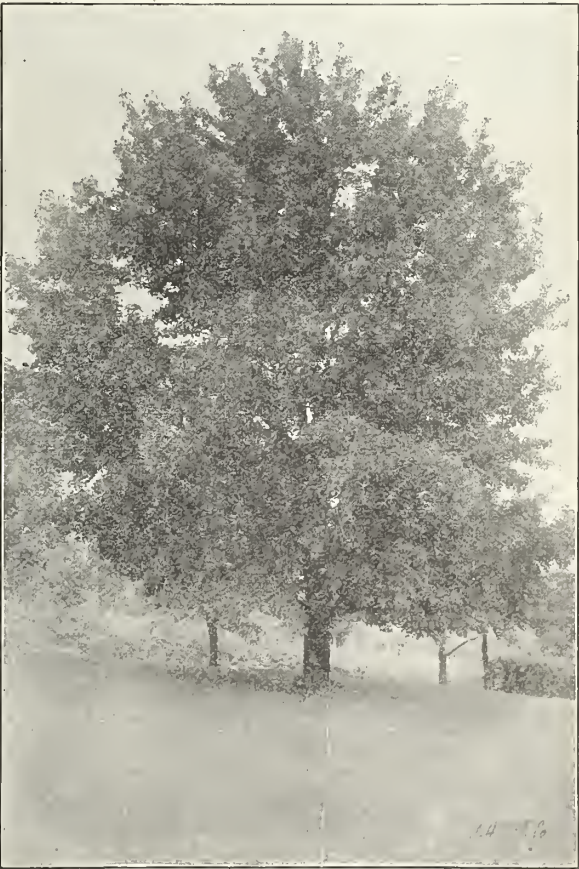

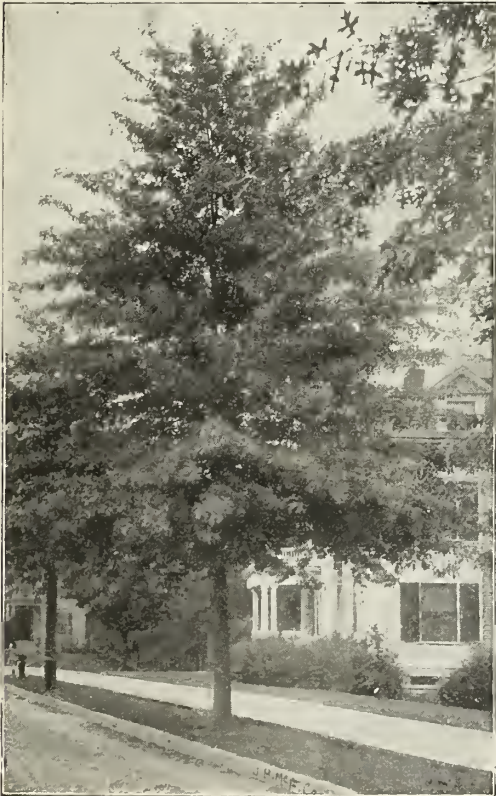

DECIDUOUS FLOWERING SHRUBS

The proper way to plant shrubs is in irregular clumps, selecting varieties that will give harmony or contrast as desired. For planting in borders, about the house foundations, or in corners, flowering shrubs are the most effective. Some varieties are also good for specimen planting.

When you plant shrubs, be sure to dig the hole large enough to allow the roots to be set without cramping. It is always good policy to have the bottom of the hole a little larger than the top. The plant should be set firmly, the soil tamped gently, leaving a shallow space around the stem. This serves as a saucer to hold water.

Prune your shrubs after they have finished flowering, thinning out all dead or spindly branches. It is well to keep the soil about the plant stirred up so as to help retain the moisture about the roots. The dates given after the descriptions are the blooming periods.

ROSES

The Rose, the most beautiful of flowers, has something about it that puts it so far above others that there can be no comparison. Its wonderful color, entrancing perfume, and fine form have endeared it to all of us who love beautiful things.

To look at this "Queen of Flowers" one always wonders how such a delicate, fragile-appearing blossom can be grown successfully except by an expert, yet it can be done quite readily. As might naturally be supposed of a flower so delicate, it delights in a rich, fertile soil. Roses can thrive and produce their handsome blooms in a poor soil no more than a man can do a good day's work without food.

An excellent way to insure abundance and quality of bloom is to dig a hole to a depth of 2 feet. Cover the bottom with about a foot of well-rotted manure, mixed with a small amount of soft soil. The top foot should be filled up with a mixture of about three parts good loam and one part pulverized manure. Cow manure is the best fertilizer, but if you can't get it, use something else—only be sure it is well rotted; do not use fresh manure. If drainage is poor, dig out an extra foot at the bottom and fill in with small stones.

Set the plants **just the same depth as in the nursery**. That is their natural depth and they will do better if set that way. The best time to plant is in the spring when the frost gets out of the ground. Any time up to the first of June will do.

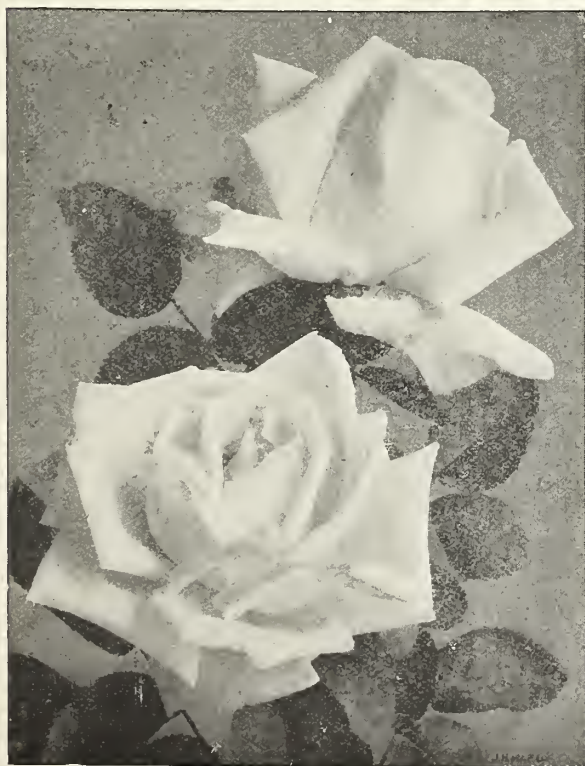

HYBRID PERPETUAL ROSES

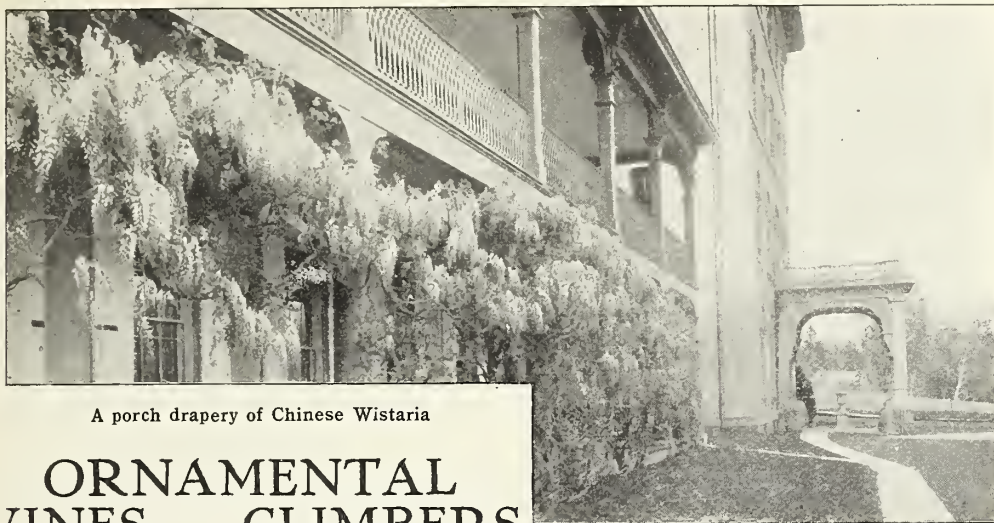

ORNAMENTAL VINES AND CLIMBERS

For porch draperies or for covering walls, fences, stumps, or other unsightly objects, Vines and Creepers have a place all their own. They grow rapidly, are hardy, and require no care. Some vines like shade, while others are fond of the sun. They should be planted in a deep rich soil, and an occasional top-dressing of decayed manure will help them to make a strong growth. In the list below we offer those which we think will give the best satisfaction in our climate.

ACTINIDIA • Silver Vine

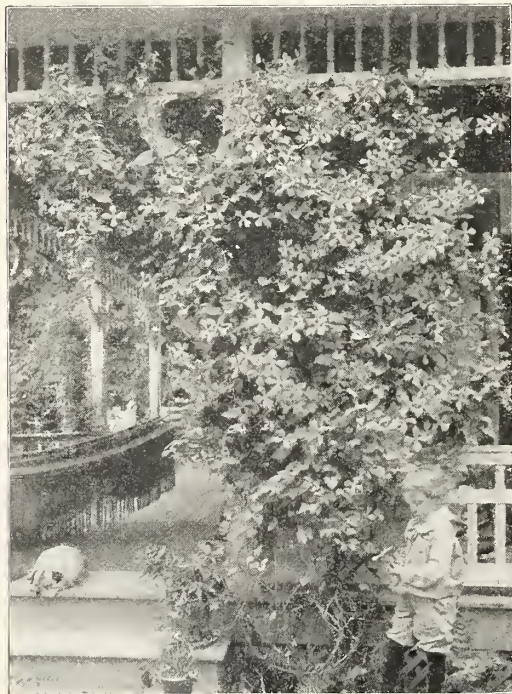

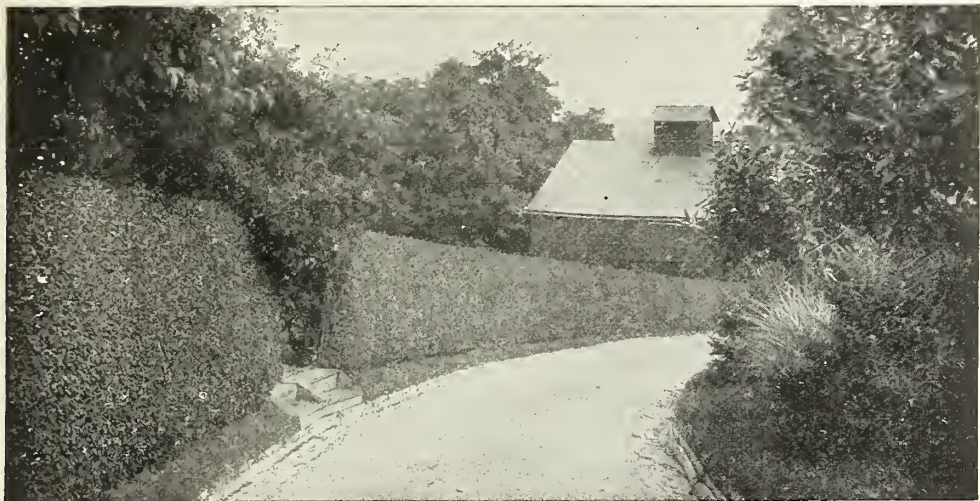

HEDGE PLANTS

You can use them as borders between your grounds and those of your neighbor, where they take the place of an unsightly fence and are just as effective, or you can use them for edging on your home grounds and near the walks. Some of these hedge plants are valuable as specimens and are often planted as such. The plants listed below will give excellent service in this locality, and we feel sure they will give good results. They are vigorous, hardy, and will thrive under ordinary conditions. Tear down that ugly fence and plant a hedge that will become more beautiful every year.

BERBERIS • Barberry

HARDY PERENNIALS

For those people who do not wish to set out new plants every spring in order to get blooms during that summer, hardy perennials are the things to plant. With these it is not necessary to replant each spring. The tops die back to the ground after frost but the roots still retain their vitality and the plants shoot up again the following spring with even greater vigor than they did before. A wide range of colors is afforded by the different sorts in our list, and we feel sure that a selection from the following varieties will give you a garden that you will be proud of.

The dates given after the descriptions are the blooming periods. It is always good practice to select varieties that will follow each other into bloom so you may have flowers all summer.

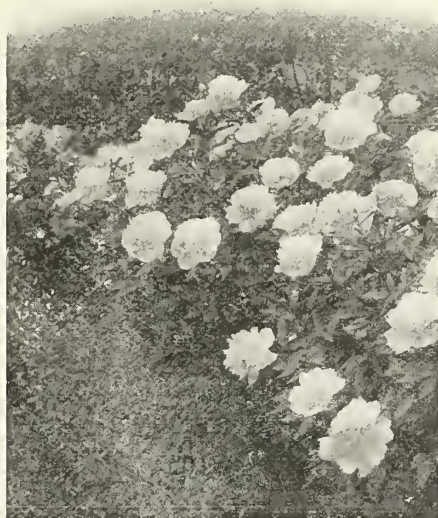

When we plant a tree or shrub, we unconsciously issue a cordial invitation to the birds to be our guests and to build their homes near ours. The orchardist would have a difficult problem if our little feathered friends, the birds, did not help him, for his crops would be destroyed by insects. This is also true of all garden and landscape plantings, for the number of insects eaten by birds is enormous.

Birds should be encouraged to come around our homes, for in addition to their great work in destroying insects, they add a living touch to our grounds. They prefer to haunt grounds that are planted with shrubs and trees that bear berries or seeds, for birds are very fond of these. The following list is made up with the desires of the birds especially in mind and your selection should be made from this list.
