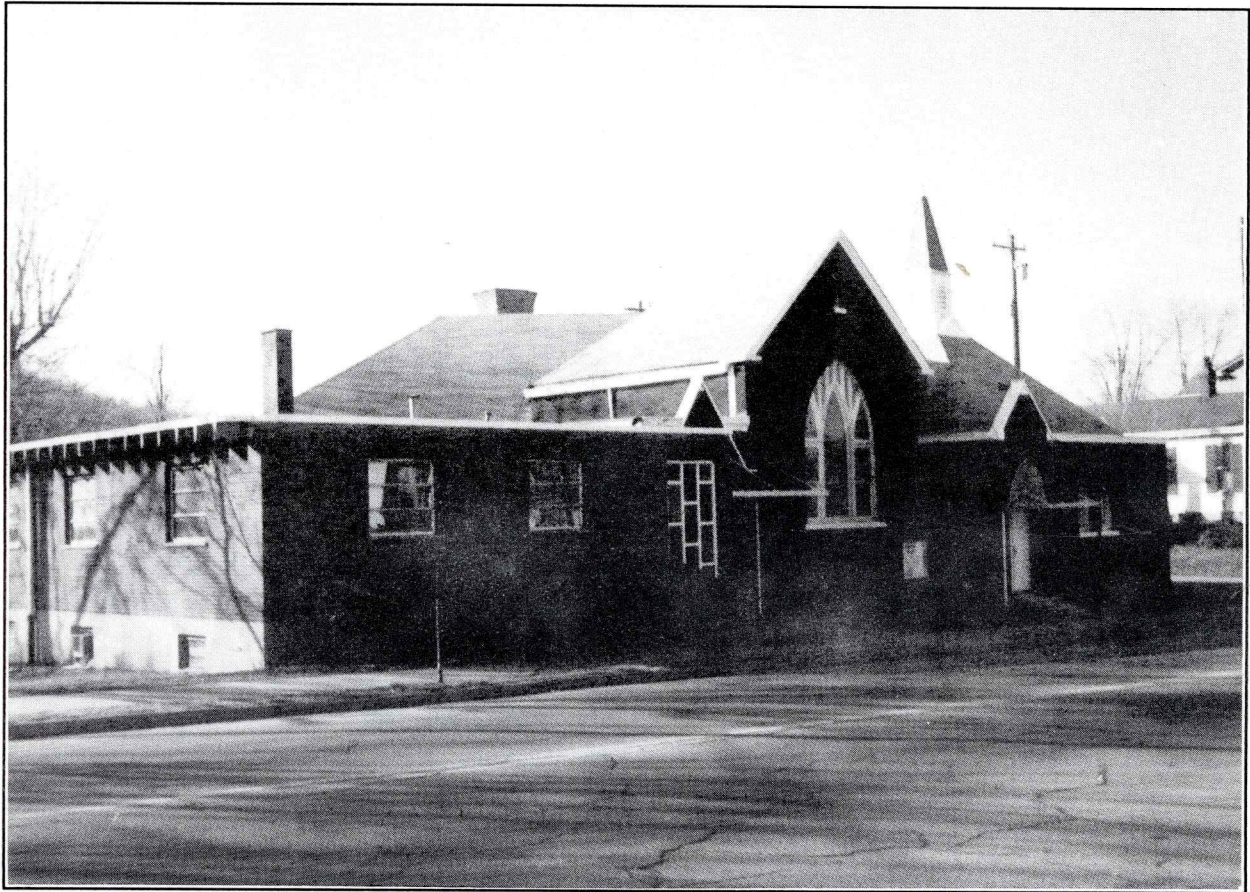

What It Was Like In 1840

Ludlow Christian Church was founded in October of 1840. The world was a very different place then. The President of the United States was Martin Van Buren of New York and the Vice President was Richard Johnson of Kentucky. In November, Van Buren was defeated for reelection by William Henry Harrison of Ohio. Harrison was inaugurated in March but caught pneumonia during the celebration and was dead within a month, the first president to die in office. He was then succeeded by Vice President John Tyler.

Kentucky had been a state for 48 years, having been admitted in 1792 as the 14th state in the Union. In 1840, the Commonwealth was represented in the U.S. Senate by the great Henry Clay. Until the spring of 1840, the Ludlow community was part of Campbell County. In response to complaints of residents who objected to the long trip to Alexandria to conduct official business, the Kentucky legislature passed a law that created Kenton County from the area on the west side of the Licking River.

In 1840 the United States was a nation deeply divided over the issue of slavery. Twenty-one years later would come the Civil War. Tensions between North and South were strong in all parts of American society including the Churches. In 1844 the Methodist Church divided; the Baptists in 1845 and the Presbyterians in 1861. The Methodists reunited in 1939 and the Presbyterians in 1983.

The Roman Catholic Church was led by Pope Gregory XVI. Kentucky Catholics

were under the jurisdiction of Bishop Benedict Joseph Flaget of Bardstown, who would later move to Louisville. Ohio Catholics were governed by Bishop John Baptist Purcell of Cincinnati who in 1837 had held a public debate with Alexander Campbell one of the founders of the Christian Church. The first Jewish congregation of the area was one year old and in 1866 would build the famous Plum Street Temple.

The first generation leaders of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) were still alive and active: Thomas Alexander Campbell in western Virginia (which would become West Virginia in 1863). Barton Stone had moved from Cane Ridge to Illinois. Walter Scott, who was instrumental in the formation of Ludlow Christian Church, lived in Carthage Ohio, but would move to Mays Lick Kentucky in 1849. The first statewide convention of the Christian Church in Kentucky was held in 1840 at Harrodsburg.

The first college of the Christian Church, founded in Georgetown in 1836, had moved in 1839 to Harrodsburg. This college merged in 1865 with Transylvania University to form Kentucky University. Later the three colleges of Kentucky University separated to become Lexington Theological Seminary, Transylvania University, and the University of Kentucky. In 1840, Alexander Campbell founded Bethany College in what is now West Virginia.

In England, Queen Victoria ruled. Her son and successor (King Edward VII) was born the next year. New Zealand was first





settled by the British in 1840 and the next year would be organized as colony. In 1840 the first British explorer crossed the continent of Australia.

In France the emperor Napoleon had been defeated and the nation was ruled by King Louis-Philippe. He would be overthrown in 1848 by the nephew of the great Napoleon who would later declare himself as the Emperor Napoleon III. Neither Germany nor Italy were united nations, but a collection of small countries. Both would be unified in 1870. The great Russian Empire was ruled by Tsar Nicholas I.

1840 was the beginning of major railroad expansion in the United States, although work did not begin on the Southern Railroad into Kentucky until 1870. American ship builders were busy constructing the clipper ships, which crossed the Atlantic under canvas sails. The first steam ship did not cross the ocean until 1845.

Long distance travel was done on horseback or on riverboats. The first railroad did not come to the area until 1841. To cross the Ohio River, one had to travel by ferry boat since there was no bridge until 1867.

In Europe, the first chemical insecticides were already being used. Doctors had identified the disease polio although there was no vaccine for it until 1953. The first postage stamps were manufactured in Britain in 1840 and the first Christmas cards appeared in 1843. In 1839 Charles Goodyear developed the process to vulcanize rubber that made possible all sorts of new uses, including the rubber band which first appeared in 1845.

Many simple things that we take for granted did not exist in 1840. The

doughnut with a hole in it did not appear until 1850. Wieners were introduced in 1852 although there were no hot dogs until 1900. The potato chip was invented in 1853. Grocery stores did not have square bottomed paper sacks until 1873. Canned foods were first seen in the stores in 1880. Coca Cola and Dr. Pepper were first sold in 1886. Pepsi Cola did not appear until 1895. The Hershey bar was not seen until 1894 and no one ever saw an ice cream cone before 1904. While aspirin was invented in Germany in 1899, Northern Kentucky headaches had to wait until 1915 when it was introduced in the United States.

Fashionable ladies in 1840 wore hoop skirts until 1860 when the bustle became the latest fashion. That year Levi Strauss introduced his men's trousers made of denim that came to bear his first name. The first rubber soled tennis shoes could not be bought until 1917. "Bloomers," the knee length pantaloons for women were invented by Amelia Bloomer in 1851.

The first telephones in the Cincinnati area were installed in 1878. The first commercial radio station went on the air in Pittsburgh and the first American television station started broadcasting in 1939 in New York. The first radio station in this area went on the air in 1922 and the first television station in 1948. In 1840 the first daily newspaper was published in Cincinnati. Modern football started in 1862. Basketball was not played until 1891. The first baseball game was played in 1846. The Cincinnati Reds were not founded until 1869.

In 1840 the population of the Cincinnati area was approximately 50,000. Today the metropolitan area includes over 1.7 million people.





The History Of The Ludlow Christian Church

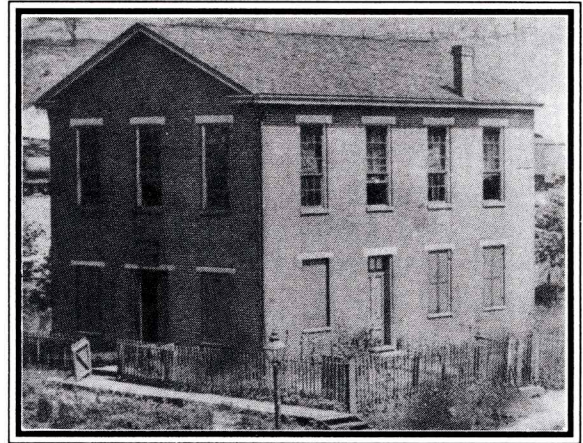
The Ludlow Christian Church, the oldest in Ludlow, was organized in 1840. The small group met in the home of Mr. J. Glaspohl, which stood on a hillside overlooking land known for many years as the Lagoon Park Company. Services were held there until 1846, when the Glaspohl family moved west to Iowa.

The congregation used a little schoolhouse on Ash Street from 1846 to 1850. Services were conducted by visiting ministers or members, with baptism in the Ohio river.

The James Downey family moved here in 1846 and built their home at the foot of Locust Street. It is still standing, an old landmark of Ludlow. Mr. Downey and his family were helpful factors in the growth of the church. He died at the age of 87 in 1891.

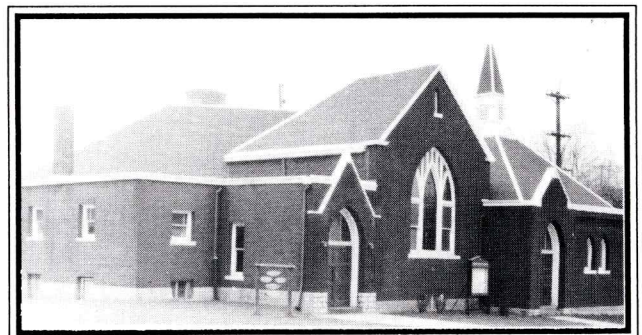
The first church was erected in 1851 on the site where the present church stands today at Elm and Locust Streets. Mrs. Israel Ludlow, wife of the founder of the founder of the city, presented the congregation with a gift of land. This was in gratitude for her son's becoming a Christian.

A two-story brick structure, this first building also served as the Ludlow Public School. The church was on the second floor. The old church also served as a community meeting place, and there in 1864 the city was organized. The city administration was housed there for several years.



In 1895 the old building was torn down and replaced by the present structure. Services were held during the entire period in the Odd Fellows Temple on Elm Street. The new church was constructed for \$6,000 and was dedicated on Sunday, January 19, 1896. The mortgage was burned in services on April 26, 1908.

The "old" church had Sunday School and Worship Services every Sunday, with a prayer meeting on Wednesday. For many years the Sunday School Superintendent was Mr. Hathaway, followed by Mr. Horton. The janitor was Mr. Blackburn who lived with his family on the first floor. A Christian Endeavor Society was organized in 1893 and there was a Ladies Aid Society.





The church was remodeled sometime between 1927 and 1933, during the ministry of G.A. Clayton. The first parsonage located at 453 Elm Street was purchased between 1934 and 1940. The first minister to occupy the home was Robert Matheny and family.

On July 30, 1945, the congregation approved the purchase of the present parsonage at 608 W. Linden Street. The purchase price was \$6,000 with \$1,000 down payment, balance at 5 percent interest. The old parsonage was sold on September 10, 1945, for \$4,500. The total amount was applied to the loan on the new parsonage, reducing the debt to \$1,000.

The church building was in need of many repairs, which began in 1946 and continued through the 1950's. The B&B Heating Company was awarded a contract on July 30, 1946, to install a new gas furnace at a cost of \$3,450, replacing the old boiler system. In August, another contract was let for the excavation and cementing of a full basement at a cost of \$2,640. Additional classrooms, social room and kitchen were provided with this project.

Renovation of the sanctuary began in May 1953. The ceiling plaster was replaced and the side walls patched by a Mr. Lopmiller for \$1,550. It was rewired by Regal Electric for \$410 and the existing light fixtures purchased at \$110 each. The chancel was restyled and the walls and floors painted.

The sanctuary could not be used during this renovation, so services were held in the J. Arden Hall at Elm and Davies Street. A dedication service was held on

October 25, 1953, when work was completed. The installation of an air conditioning system was approved by the congregation on June 5, 1955, for \$3,157.

A new education wing was constructed at a cost of \$29,109.83 and dedicated on April 1, 1962. The mortgage was burned in services in September 1973. In the 1980's, extensive remodeling and redecorating added to the efficiency and beauty of the building.

Many ministers have served this congregation. Some of the early ministers were Rev. Keene, George Buntin, J. Rambo, F. Butts, G. Coppage, George A. Joy, L.B. Haskins, J. Moody, and George Jones. The longest pastorate was held by P.H. Duncan from 1892 until 1926. The present minister is Dr. William D. Carpe. Following is a list of other ministers who have served the Ludlow Christian Church:

Six members have entered the ministry: Margaret B. Hetz, a missionary to India; Harlan C. Runyan; Walter Chesterfield Gibbs, late professor at Lexington Theological Seminary; James A. Moak, retired regional minister of the Christian Church in Kentucky; Jack Dorsey, retired





Navy Chaplain; and Roger Meredith, a pastor in Ohio.

Over the course of time there have been many faithful members who have served long and well. Two current members to be recognized are Harry Rigney and Pearl Bryant. Harry retired in 1972 after 50 years of service as Sunday School Superintendant. Pearl, who is still active has been the church organist (pianist) for 67 years.

The church has always supported community organizations and activities, as well as the programs of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ.) For many years the church was the meeting place of the Ludlow Rotary Club and Troop 20 of the Ludlow Boy Scouts.

In recent years the church has donated proceeds of the January fish fry to the Ludlow Volunteer Fire Department, Ludlow Senior Center, and Ludlow Youth Center. The church cooperates with the other churches of the community and the Northern Kentucky Interfaith Commission, a cooperative agency of the Catholic and Protestant churches in the area.

The existence, growth and preservation of this church for 150 years is a great tribute to the countless dedicated members, who have worked with love and vision to serve the spiritual needs of the congregation and community.





1990 - A Year of Celebration

Nineteen Hundred and Ninety found the church caught up in a flurry of excitement and activity in celebration of its 150th (Sesquicentennial) Anniversary. The appointment of a 150th Anniversary Planning Committee for the celebration began in January of 1989. Committee members included Wilson Rigney (chairman), Ray Anderson, Pearl Bryant, Ginger Rigney, Pat Anderson, and Pastor Bill Carpe. By the end of 1990 this committee had met over 25 times in the planning and execution of the anniversary program.

The first "Mile" was such a success, a second mile was travelled. Other fund raising activities included fish fries, a cook book, and bake sales.

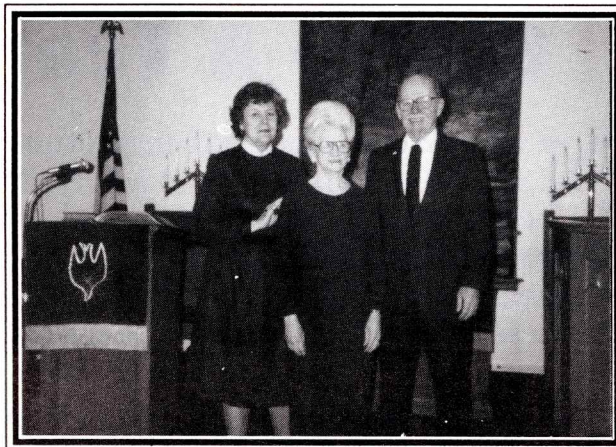

The speaker for the assembly was Michael Kinnamon, Dean of Lexington Theological Seminary. The sanctuary was filled to capacity with over 175 in attendance. A catered dinner was served at the conclusion of the assembly.

The celebration continued with an ecumenical service of thanksgiving on Sunday, May 20th at 7:00 P.M. The speaker was the Most Reverend William A. Hughes, Roman Catholic Bishop of

What is a celebration without a parade? In July, the church entered a float in the Kenton County 150th Anniversary parade. What a coincidence! A detailed replica of the original church building, constructed by Harry Chamberlain, was mounted on a flatbed truck donated and driven by John Gaiser.

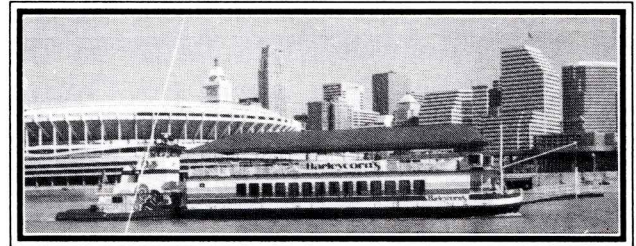


Period clothes were worn by Pearl Bryant, Ann Chamberlain, and Karen and Neal Yates. They rode the float and survived a very hot and humid day.

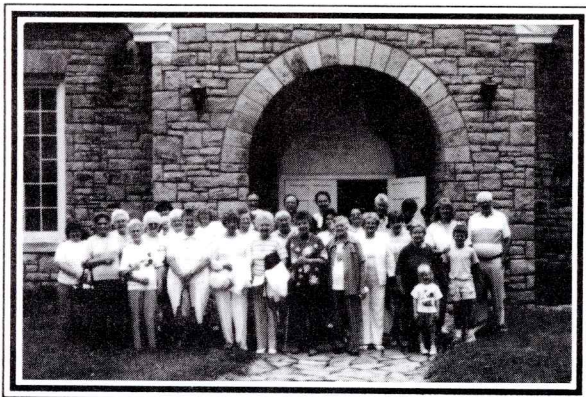


150th Anniversary Celebration of the Ludlow Christian Church

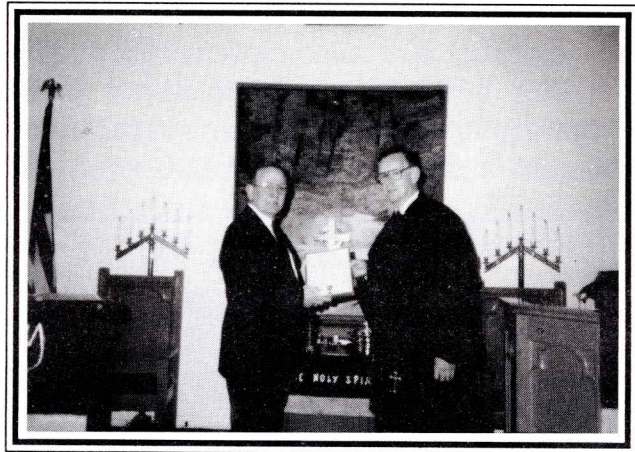
