DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Owenton, the small county seat of Owen County (see National Register form for the Owen County Courthouse and Jail listed on the National Register May 6, 1976), nevertheless boasts a number of grandiose Victorian residences scattered along the ridges that extend out from the town center. Many of the finest and most ambitious of these follow the east-west route to the west of the courthouse. Among them, Highfield stands out because of its considerable setback, extensive grounds, and relative age.

The house consists of a large five-bay two-story clapboarded block with two-story gallery in the center and a modernized two-story wing to one side. Although the overall appearance justifies the antebellum date of the house, the details of the cornice and gable brackets suggest that they were added somewhat later, although also perhaps just before the Civil War. Within the pediment is an unusual quatrefoil opening within a round arch.

The dwelling contains eleven rooms, with two hallways, in each of which is a stairway. All lumber used in the building was cut and sawed with crosscut saws, from trees on the premises, and all work was done at the site of erection. Window and door facings, window frames, and doors were made by hand. Door panels are said to represent a cross and open Bible. Shingles (replaced, probably in the mid-19th century by the existing standing-seam metal roof) were hand-hewn.

The residence now includes some modern improvements, such as electric heating, $3\frac{1}{2}$ bathrooms, electric kitchen, and air conditioning.

The iron fence which surrounds the present property was erected by T. W. Staiar, owner in the 1890s, at a cost of \$1,100. It is in splendid condition.

A small octagonal gazebo adorns one corner of the sloping front lawn. There are also appropriate frame outbuildings at the rear of the house.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Highfield is one of the earliest and largest of the impressive 19th-century residences that distinguish the outskirts of Owenton, county seat of Owen County. The county, which lies along the Kentucky River between the Ohio River and Frankfort, has varied but fertile terrain. The house in its ridge-top setting, reflects the prosperity made possible by the productive farmland, although little is known of the man for whom the house was built in the late 1840s, Willis Roberts, or of succeeding owners.

The original tract of land surrounding Highfield (about 93 acres) included the entire west section of Owenton. In the year 1785 Robert Parker bought the land from the state of Virginia. The land patent was signed by Patrick Henry, Governor. Parker died about 1818, the land going to his six heirs. Andrew W. P. Parker then acquired the real estate and, at his demise, the heirs of Colonel John C. Bacon became the owners in 1839. There were 93 acres in the plot at this time, which sold for \$600.00. George Roberts purchased the land on July 25, 1839, and he, in turn, sold the same to Willis Roberts about 1840. Shortly afterwards Willis Roberts constructed the house that now occupies the site.

John C. Breckinridge is believed to have spoken from the porch of Highfield in the early 1850s, when he was campaigning for a seat in the U. S. Congress. Breckinridge (1821-1875), a prominent lawyer and politician, served in the State legislature in 1849, the U. S. Congress in 1851 and 1853, Vice President of the U. S. under Buchanan in 1856, U. S. Senator in 1861, and Secretary of War in the Confederate Cabinet.

In his campaigns for a Congressional seat in 1851 and again in 1853, Breckinridge received strong support from Owen County, which was crucial in his victories. In both elections, Breckinridge's Whig opponents were favored to win because of their firm backing in the inner Bluegrass counties. However, Breckinridge's overwhelming victories in Owen County and adjoining Scott County overcame the Whig candidates support in the richer counties of the Bluegrass, giving him the victory. In genuine appreciation, the family and friends called Breckinridge's youngest son "Owen County," which name was soon shortened to Owen. His son was known by this name until adulthood (Heck, p.35).


